St. Andrews continues to meet in person on Sundays at 10AM. The service is also streamed at 10AM and will be uploaded and available on YouTube later in the day.

## As We Adapt...

Acting upon the request of Pastor Robin for additional leave to allow her to care for infant son Dashiell, whose health continues to be precarious, the Session of St. Andrews this past Sunday, July 25, voted unanimously to extend her maternity leave for an additional month, through August. The Session also voted to accept her husband Troy, an ordained pastor in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and a member of the Presbytery of Carlisle, to fill in for her, as Head of Staff and to assume her duties and responsibilities in leading our congregation for that month.

Pastor Robin will, however, conduct the worship service and administer Communion on Sunday, August 1, and moderate the Session meeting on Tuesday evening, August 3. Except for those two duties, Pastor Troy will assume all responsibilities for Pastor Robin as of August 1.

The Deacons will continue to work closely with Pastor Troy to provide pastoral care to members of the congregation in need of such support.

**Pastor Troy will be keeping office hours Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays from 10AM—2PM.**

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## *A Note from Diane*

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

A month or two ago, I was pulling a few weeds in the yard, and I saw a small brown shoot sticking up out of the ground, with a single leaf on the end of it. "That doesn't belong there, right next to the driveway," I thought to myself, so I reached down and gave it a little tug but it didn't come up. I bent down and pulled, and tugged... and finally, it came up! At the other end of that little brown shoot was an acorn! It wasn't a weed at all. It was the start of a new tree... an oak tree!

In my backyard there are several big oak trees, and that's how they got their start... from a skinny brown shoot sticking out of a buried acorn. And now they're big, sturdy trees.

It is interesting that Jesus used a tree as a metaphor for humans - for you and me. In Luke's Gospel, he says to his disciples, "You can tell what a tree is like by the fruit it produces. No good tree bears bad fruit, nor does a bad tree bear good fruit. People do not pick figs from thornbushes, or grapes from briars." OK, so Jesus is really saying, "You can tell what a person is like by the fruit he or she produces." What kind of fruit are you producing? Sweet or bitter? Figs or thorns?

Back to real trees for a moment. I may look at a tree in the Spring and have no idea what kind of tree it is. But come late summer, and I see apples hanging off the branches... Duh! I can tell it's an apple tree. Yes, you CAN tell a tree by the fruit it produces. And Jesus is right to compare humans to trees in that way. When a tree matures and bears fruit, you can tell whether it's a fig tree or a thorn bush. And you cannot pick figs ... or grapes or apples from thorn bushes! All you get from a thorn bush are scratches and bloody fingers.

Do you know any people who are thornbushes? I do, and they're not very pleasant to be around! For the most part you can tell a person by their fruit, and you and I, and all God's people are supposed to bear delicious healthy fruit. In Galatians 5:22 the Apostle Paul gives us a list of the kind of fruit we are supposed to produce: The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, humility and self-control.

God wants to produce Christlike qualities in me and you, so we will be productive, and share our fruit with others. But you know what? In order to produce the fruit of the Spirit, we need to be rooted and grounded in the spirit... God's Spirit. Yes, it's the roots that sink down deep into the soil, that soak up the nu-

trients and nourish the tree. The only way we can produce the fruit of love and faithfulness, peace and goodness, humility and patience, is if our roots are receiving those qualities from what we are feeding on... if we are rooted and grounded in God love, if our roots are sinking deep into God's love.

Rooted and grounded in love, so that we can bear fruit ... The fruit of the Spirit, and share that fruit with all those around us. Are you patient? Are you kind? Are you sharing your love, your peace and your joy with others?

Keep it up! Sink your roots deep into the love of God, so that you may produce and share the fruit of the Spirit.

As Pastor Robin comes back, and as she and her husband, Troy, work together, sharing in ministry, let us show them our care and appreciation, and reach out in love and prayer. And let us extend and share our spiritual fruit with everyone we meet, each and every day.

# SESSION NOTES

The Session met on Tuesday, July 6, 2021 at 7:00 PM in Snyder Hall.

Rev. Humphrey opened the meeting with a devotion considering the various intentions of different worship design styles. He noted that different worship styles can bring fundamentally different experiences to different people as they participate.

The devotion was followed by prayer, and a motion was made and passed to approve the Consent Agenda and the minutes from the June 2021 meeting.

Deacons: Jean Ditzler was the deacon representative at the Session meeting. Jean shared that each deacon will be consulting with their people about preferences regarding online and in-person worship as we continue through this challenging Covid time.

Trustees: Trustees continue to address various ongoing and seasonal maintenance issues. One notable item under consideration involves significant repairs to one AC unit.

The Women of the Congregation (PW) group submitted a letter to Session explaining that they have dissolved the PW chapter here at St. Andrews. Our PW group has served faithfully for years, coordinating important presbytery projects such as the Thank Offering and Birthday Offering. They also supported collections for Agape and DVI of Lebanon, as well as CWS' Blanket Sunday. We are grateful for their extensive, faithful service to God's work in the world.

Standing Committee Reports:

Worship: The Wednesday Outdoor Worship program continues (despite one rainout); attendance has ranged around 30-35 people. The committee has asked Session members to contribute to the reflection portions of these programs.

Christian Education: The St. Andrews Explores program is up and running; sixteen children meet on Wednesdays to participate in a musical opening, scripture discussions, and activities based on the theme of each day (arts, drama, sports, and water). Thank you to the church volunteers who prepare lunches for the children.



Congregational Life: The All-Church Picnic returns on September 12! The committee will continue to encourage fellowship during the summer months with coffee hours outside on the first Sunday of each month.

Mission: The committee is seeking volunteers for Mission Week (August 8-14); there is sign up information in the Narthex. Activities include Habitat, Rails to Trails clean-up, a trip to Mission Central in Mechanicsburg, and a special Vet Appreciation Video project through the VA coordinated by Maggie Beatty. LCCM Business: Session members met at LCCM to serve the July Free Noon Meal; the Mission Committee will cover the August meal at LCCM. Kathy Crager is the new second Mission Committee delegate to LCCM meetings. Regarding the prospective, permanent LCCM emergency shelter, planning continues for fundraising for the project.

Administration / Personnel: the committee did not meet in July.

Stewardship and Finance: Two of the three projectors are scheduled to be replaced by the fall; no other budget news to report. The church continues to enjoy the blessings of financial support; offerings can be made via mail, on-line, in person during service, or via text.

Treasurer's Report: Submitted without comment; committee chairs should submit committee budgets to Rob Lowrie before October.

Nominating: The committee has already made progress with nominations, and will send letters describing the nominated positions to potential nominees; committee members will contact nominees as well.

Visioning: The committee has obtained approval for the permit for the play area to be installed on the Poplar Street side of the building. They are currently creating a list of events and activities to be held in the space once it is completed. They are also discussing signage to include scripture passages.

The meeting was adjourned with a prayer by Karen Fedder. The next meeting of the Session is scheduled for Tuesday, August 3, 2021 at 7 PM.

To whom shall we turn in our sorrow? We have many choices, and need different kinds of comfort and reassurance at different times. Sometimes we need other people. Sometimes we need our own solitude.
